WORTHY of Quality Care

Kids are worthy of quality care. One way that Josiah White's ensures this mindset has been through adopting and implementing the Teaching Family Model (TFM). TFM is an evidence-based & trauma-informed best practice treatment and management approach. It prioritizes therapeutic relationships with caregivers as the primary means of effective treatment in supportive family-style settings. This model is highly adaptable and is designed to fit the unique needs of all types of children and families.

Josiah White's foster parents, Nicholas and Julie Niman, implement this model into their everyday life. They and their adoptive children welcomed a 16-year-old young man into their home nearly a year and a half ago. This teen came in with many challenges. He has posed several learning curves for the Niman family. However, patience, perseverance, and love has outweighed these difficulties.

"When he first came here, he was under the impression that if he made a mistake, we were going to write him off," said Julie. "He was afraid that if he went behind our back or let us down that he would be kicked out, but our response to him took him by surprise. We proved to him over and over that we would not be quitting or giving up on him. He is learning to trust in us just as we are in him. It is beyond worth it to watch as he recognizes the value in himself and see that pride growing over time."

TFM helped equip the Nimans to better care for this teen and help him recognize his inherent worth. This now 17-year-old boy has gone from over 7 school tardies and the loss of a part-time job to now keeping up with his school work, maintaining a job, and pursuing a newfound interest in culinary arts.

"What is really great about the Teaching Family Model is the grace," said Julie. "Oftentimes, children make mistakes, and they are afraid that they have lost their worth. What we have been able to demonstrate is that his worth is not wrapped up in anything in particular. He is already worthy. It is not something that needs to be earned."

TFM was part of provoking this change, but not without the faith and commitment of the Niman's. All it takes is one person, one family. It is Josiah White's hope to partner with the One and whom He calls to serve, protect, and provide for His mission.



WORTHY AT ANY AGE



At 10 years old, Brooklyn Gard felt a tug on her heart from God to be involved with Foster Care.

Brooklyn's aunt and uncle were both foster parents, and she recalls visiting their house as a child and seeing the impact the foster care system had on the children placed with them. One night while Brooklyn was visiting her aunt and uncle, they got a phone call in the middle of the night to take in a foster placement. The child came with nothing, but Brooklyn's aunt took her in and gave her clothes to wear to bed and toiletries to take a shower. At that moment, Brooklyn told herself "I want to give children a place to feel safe and loved like that, even if it is just for a moment."

When Brooklyn was 19 years old, her own parents became foster parents. Their first placement was a newborn baby boy who was in the NICU in Fort Wayne. Every day, Brooklyn and her mom would drive to Fort Wayne to sit with, sing to, and read to this precious baby boy. He came home with them shortly after but needed a lot of medical care. Brooklyn's parents received several other placements over the months to come, including a sibling set of a 2 month old boy and a 2 year old boy. Shortly after the boys came to live with them, Brooklyn's parents realized taking care of a medically fragile baby along with their other

placements was just more than they could handle.

During this time, Brooklyn was just shy of her 21st Birthday and was a single woman living in an apartment with her best friend. However, she knew she wanted to be a foster parent, and she strongly believed that family should always stay together. So, Brooklyn listened to that tug on her heart from God and pursued getting her foster care license and got all the paperwork completed right before she turned 21. She moved into an apartment big enough for herself and the two boys and shortly after, they came to live with her.

The boys lived with Brooklyn for 2 years until they reunified with their biological family. At 22 years old, Brooklyn bought a house to make a stable home for children to grow and learn in. At 25 years old, God gave her Payge.

Payge moved into Brooklyn's home at the end of January 2021. Each day leading up to Valentine's Day, Brooklyn affirmed Payge's inherent worth by placing a heart on Payge's bedroom door, telling her why she loved her. Brooklyn thought Payge would think this was "silly." She feared she would take the hearts down. In actuality, Payge loved the idea and would wake up every morning with anticipation, wondering what the

next heart would say. Payge even showed her friends when they would come over. The hearts staved on Payge's door year-round, and new ones have been added.

"I think children, especially teenagers, are struggling to find their self-worth, so putting up little reminders around the house for them to see on days when they are feeling down and struggling, really benefits their confidence," said Brooklyn.

Payge spent more than seven years in the foster care system -2,260days, to be exact! She moved to five different foster homes. She watched her sisters age out of the system. She moved over an hour away from where she grew up and had two failed adoptions.

At 26 years old, Brooklyn officially adopted Payge, giving Brooklyn a daughter and Payge a mother with a forever home and a village full of love.

"I had a lot of feelings going on during this time because it was a very real moment that was about to change my life," said Payge." I was nervous, but also excited for the long journey ahead. I sort of felt like I was betraying my family by having another one, but soon realized I was just gaining another one. I was also very worried something would happen or go wrong, and I was going to have

another failed adoption, but that didn't happen, and I am very relieved about that."

Brooklyn said some people ask why she would go from fostering toddlers to adopting a teenager. She shared, "So many teenagers are aging out of the system daily, and it is heartbreaking to know these children will be less likely to have a family. Just because they are older, does not mean they are less valuable."

When Brooklyn became a young, single foster mother, she had many hesitations and fears. She questioned whether she would be able to give children in her care all they needed to be at their fullest potential and worried if she would be able to give them enough attention while working a fulltime job. Brooklyn soon overcame these fears by realizing the things she was fearing and worried about were typical of all parents. Brooklyn knew she could promise that every child who came in and out of her home would be loved, safe, and cared for. Brooklyn also learned to lean on her support system, including her parents and church family. Josiah White's is so grateful for Brooklyn's example in not letting her fears stop her from pursuing God's calling on her life to become a foster

parent, even at a young age.
