COMMUNITY SUPPORT

Nine months out of the year, all of the regional Josiah White's Foster Care offices host in-service trainings for their foster families. Not only does this allow them to get the hours that they need to maintain their foster home license with the state, but it also gives foster parents an opportunity to connect with other Josiah White's families.

Each office's staff provides dinner to their foster families at these trainings and gives them a chance to get to know one another, make connections, and have good conversations with other families that share similar experiences while they enjoy the meal.

"One of our foster mothers was just telling me that she hit it off so well with another foster mother at our last in-service training that they worked it out to be able to provide respite for each other as needed." said Makayla Mullins, Family Specialist in South Bend.

In addition to the community aspect, Josiah White's staff puts thought and effort into choosing training topics that will prove beneficial to the foster families. Some of the topics Josiah White's staff have covered over the last year include the five love languages, foster parent rights, human trafficking awareness and prevention, and trauma-informed care.

Community support is a big part of having a successful journey as a foster family. Josiah White's tries to find as many ways as possible to create opportunities for foster families to get to know one another and make those important connections, as well as provide great training opportunities that equip our families with the tools they need to be prepared for their journey as a foster home.

When Jeff and Deanna Albertson were dating, they revealed to each other they both wanted to become foster parents one day. After getting pregnant early in their marriage, Jeff and Deanna began the foster care licensing process shortly after their firstborn son turned one-year-old. They received their first placement before his second birthday and have now been faithfully fostering for over 20 years.

Several months ago, Deanna talked with Dana Gault, Josiah White's Regional Manager for the Wabash office, about stepping down from being a foster parent. Dana asked her if she had prayed about it, and she said, no, because she knew that God was calling her to continue, so she has.

A couple months after that, Jeff and Deanna received a placement of Logan*, a teen with significant behavioral and emotional needs that was prone to throwing temper tantrums. Shortly into his stay, Logan decided he would like a pet fish. Deanna, in an effort to positively motivate him, created a sticker chart and explained to him that each day that went by without a temper tantrum, Logan was awarded a sticker. Deanna clarified she didn't expect him to be perfect and he was allowed to get angry, but it was what he did with his anger that mattered.

As promised, each day that went by without a temper tantrum, Logan was awarded a sticker. When he earned seven stickers, he got his aquarium. After earning the next seven, he got the rocks for the bottom of the aquarium. Logan is now working towards the next seven stickers to earn aquarium accessories. When he has earned 28 stickers total, Jeff and Deanna will take him to get his fish.

Had Jeff and Deanna stepped down several months ago, they would have missed out on the opportunity to help Logan, and Logan would have missed out on Jeff and Deanna's expertise from their years of experience as foster parents, which equipped them to help Logan learn how to express his emotions in healthier ways.

Deanna recalls a conversation with a missionary friend in which her friend expressed she could never imagine being a foster parent. Deanna reflected back that she couldn't imagine being in a different country away from her family and friends. The two women marveled about how God equips different people for different callings.

Josiah White's is so grateful that God has equipped Jeff and Deanna with creativity while serving the children in their home over the past 20 years of their ministry.

The Lord equips those He uses for His purpose. Christians often think that individuals are equipped through miraculous means, like special gifts of skill naturally bestowed on us at birth or even as one sleeps. However, most often, the Lord provides opportunity for these skills to grow with discipline and practice over time in seemingly mundane ways. Let's take David for example. We know that he was young and that Goliath saw him as a boy. However, we also know that by the time David faced Goliath, he had faced and killed fierce predators. This was not the first time he had faced a deadly foe. We know that as a shepherd, he probably had ample opportunities to practice his skill with a sling-shot. This was most likely not David's first or even hundredth time using this tool. He was equipped to face Goliath through his daily usage of the skills needed of a young shepherd.

As this edition of Fostering Futures focuses on the concept of being equipped, so many expressions of this seem evident in our ministry. Our foster parents seek to equip the kids in their care with skills needed to progress in life. Josiah White's seeks to equip our foster parents with tools to do that well, as their ministry is not an easy one. As a leader and administrator in the foster care ministry, I seek to equip our local leaders and staff with the tools and skills to support those foster families well. As an organization, we have recently adopted the Teaching Family Model as a lens and guide for how we provide foster care. This has been a significant effort at equipping those called to this ministry as they pour into the lives of those entrusted to our care.

This year, as we focused on ensuring we are prepared to serve the needs of kids in care, we made the prayerful decision to move our regional office in Columbus, Indiana further north to Greenwood. Josiah White's has not made this significant of an office move in over a decade. However, this move was driven by two realizations. First, as our Columbus team grew, we found it harder and harder to adequately staff the team with professional staff from the Bartholomew County area. Key positions on the team would be left open for challenging lengths of time while we searched, impacting our ability to support families and children well. Second, we recognized that the majority of children served by that team were actually coming from Johnson and Marion Counties. There were not enough homes in these areas and the children were having to leave their home counties to be served in counties further south.

This move has created some short term instability for sure, but we are already finding that we receive more applicants for our positions and that the local community and local churches are more interested in supporting what they see as a local ministry team. The need is great in this area and so is the opportunity to grow and serve. In this example, our location is actually equipping us to better serve the purpose we discern the Lord providing. Please join me in praying for the success of our Greenwood team as we grow and as we continue supporting those foster families the Lord has entrusted to us.
